## **The Society for the Protection of Unborn Children: Aims and Objectives**

The Society was founded in the United Kingdom in January 1967 to rally opposition to the abortion bill then being debated in Parliament. Following its enactment as the Abortion Act 1967, the Society maintains its fundamental opposition to that Act.

The Principal Aims and Objectives of the Society are:

1. To affirm, defend and promote the existence and value of human life from the moment of conception until natural death.
2. To defend and protect human life generally and in particular, whether born or unborn (although principally the latter) and wheresoever situated (although principally in Great Britain and Northern Ireland, the Isle of Man, the Channel Islands, the Republic of Ireland and Europe).
3. To reassert the principle laid down in the United Nations' "Declaration of the Rights of the Child" (1959) that "the child by reason of his physical and mental immaturity, needs special safeguards and care, including legal protection, before as well as after birth."
4. To defend, assist and promote the life and welfare of mothers during pregnancy and of their unborn children from the time of conception up to, during and after birth.
